A letter from Superintendent Brian C. Monahan:

The district has been performing water quality testing in accordance with legislation signed by Governor Cuomo on September 6. The new law requires all New York State public schools to test for lead levels of all sources of water used, or potentially used, for drinking or cooking.

The State Department of Health and State Education Department have established an action level of 15 parts per billion (PPB). Water sources that test higher than this threshold and are used for drinking or food preparation must be removed from service while corrective action is taken.

At Minisink Valley High School all 230 sources of water were tested regardless of their specific use, without exception. All water sources used for drinking and food preparation tested below the allowable 15 parts per billion. They include water fountains, student and faculty sinks, kitchen sinks, locker room sinks and the ice machine.

Of the 74 fixtures that tested above the action level, 64 are science laboratory sinks. The remaining 10 fixtures consist of three hose connections in the pool area; two kitchen kettle fillers that are not in use; one office sink; and four science prep sinks.

Complete test results for the high school are available on the Community Info page of our website. Results for the middle school are expected in the days ahead.

All of the affected fixtures and/or areas are clearly identified as unsuitable for drinking, and the district is implementing a plan to replace and retest fixtures as needed.

Please be assured that we are taking all the necessary steps to ensure that the quality of drinking and cooking water throughout our district meets state regulations. Upon completion of the district's remediation plan and retesting process, we will inform you of the results.
